intimately we know Jesus, the less stronghold fear has over us. How did intentionality in these areas



MESSENGERS - WEEK 2:

TEXTS: LUKE 2:10-11, JOHN 9:1-41

(Play Video)

THE POINT: WHO HAS GOD CALLED YOU TO BRING THE MESSAGE OF GOOD NEWS TO THIS CHRISTMAS SEASON?



As disciples, we are continually on a journey until Jesus calls us home or returns. This week's sermon points to a disciple's duty to love all people by sharing their faith.

VIDEO SEGMENT 1:

(Pause Video)

Have someone read Luke 2:8-13 loud.

Questions

The first messenger of the gospel, an angel, brought the gospel message to shepherds, who were known as social outcasts. At this time in history, it would have been opposite of social norms to bring such news to 'the least of these', but Jesus is often working in ways that seem opposite of the norm. The angel begins by comforting the shepherds, telling them that they should not fear and then immediately reveals the reason they were not to be afraid, "I bring you good news..."

- 1. What does this passage reveal to us about the character of Jesus? God could have chosen anyone in the world to bring the gospel message to first, yet He chose lowly shepherds. This isn't a mistake, nor a lapse in judgement, but rather, Jesus was already showing us that He would associate Himself with 'the least of these'. In His humility and kindness, the Savior of the world chose to use the shepherds for the sake of the gospel at such a time as this.)
- 2. Fill in the blank: Hearing and believing that God is ____ changes the way I _____. (Example: Hearing and believing that God is humble and kind changes the way I act and react towards others.)
- 3. The birth of Jesus was considered good news for a reason it would change the world. What news or event in your life, was life-changing for you? How is God using that life changing news or event in your life for His Glory?

VIDEO SEGMENT 2:

(Pause Video) Have someone read John 9: 8-27 out loud.

Questions

In this passage, we see a man who was born blind, receive healing from Jesus. While the man was ill-equipped to share his good news, he personally shared his story with everyone he came in contact with. At least three different times in John 9, Pharisees asked the man how or why Jesus healed him and all the man could do was share his story. The people most impacted by the blind man's story were the ones who knew him before his healing even occurred.

- 4. What does this passage tell us about the nature of who Jesus is? Look at verse 2 to guide your answer. (In verse 2, Jesus says that this man was born blind, not because of his sin or his parents sin, but so that the works of God might be displayed in him. This shows us that God's plan is much higher than our own. Sometimes we are blind to God's plan until it comes to fruition, but we can always have faith that His plans are better than our own.)
- 5. The blind man was ill-equipped to share his faith, but he still did it regardless. He shared the good news by sharing his story personally. How does this encourage you to share your faith?

 (By sharing your story personally, it creates a bond between you and the person(s) you are sharing with. You never know who you could impact by sharing your story.)
- 6. The people who were most impacted by the blind man's story were the people who knew him before he was healed. Who are the people in your life that you feel called to share your healing (salvation) story with? (Share as you feel led.)

DISCIPLESHIP JOURNEY ACTION STEP

In order for good news to actually be good news, it has to be news, it has to be heralded, and it has to be good. This week, we challenge you to share your faith with someone. This can be done by sharing the gospel, sharing an invitation, sharing your story, sharing coffee, or sharing in pain and prayer. But regardless of how it looks, sharing your faith will not only impact the person(s) you share it with, but it will also impact you! If you know who that person is, let your group know so they can pray for them and you and your time together.
